Charlotte was also grateful for the information provided by the financial advisers.

"Since I retired from the Army I haven't worked, so I was glad the financial planning class helped me learn how to stretch my coins," she said. "I was also excited to learn about credit freezes since a lot of people I know have been victims of credit fraud."

During program activities, WWP staff closely interacted with attendees and advised them of additional programs and services offered.

"The WWP representatives shared a lot of information and showed concern about people's situations," Eve said.

"They also followed up with us after the class. I'm thankful to WWP for allowing me and my husband to attend
this class, and everything else they do for soldiers and their families."

By providing assistance with educational and employment goals, and physical, mental, and emotional recovery, WWP helps injured warriors gain and maintain their independence.

"Wounded Warrior Project is a good organization that has helped me adjust to my new normal," Charlotte said.
